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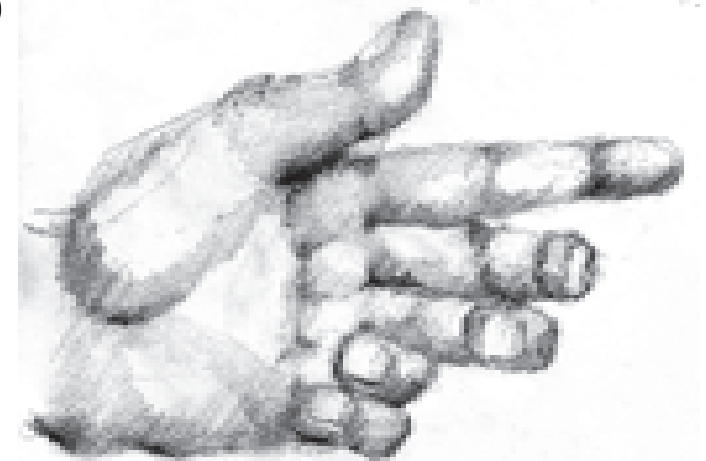

Meditation

God Walks With Us

Holy Week is the most solemn of the Church's year. It takes us through the dramatic events of the life of Christ from his triumphant welcome as King into Jerusalem, his final teaching in the temple, his betrayal, the Last Supper with his disciples with the institution of the Eucharist and his Priesthood, the vigil of anguish in Gethsemane where he was joined by a few loyal friends, his arrest and show-trial where he was deserted and betrayed by his closest friends, his death on the cross, burial in the tomb and finally the reports of the women who had gone to tend to his body on the third day, that he was not there. He had risen. There are many ways in which we can say, what the coming of Jesus as a man tells us about God and his Plan for his creation. One thing we can say is that in the life and death of Jesus the God, who walks with us, is revealed. In the story of Holy Week we get to know the God who walks with us through our lives.

Cardinal Newman tells us that the God who goes with us knows us. He knows us for he made us. He knows the rising and falling of our spirits. The beating of our hearts and the breath in our bodies. He looks on our face to see if we are smiling or in tears. He has counted the hairs on our head and the height to which we have grown. He embraces us totally and takes us into his arms. This is the God who goes with us.

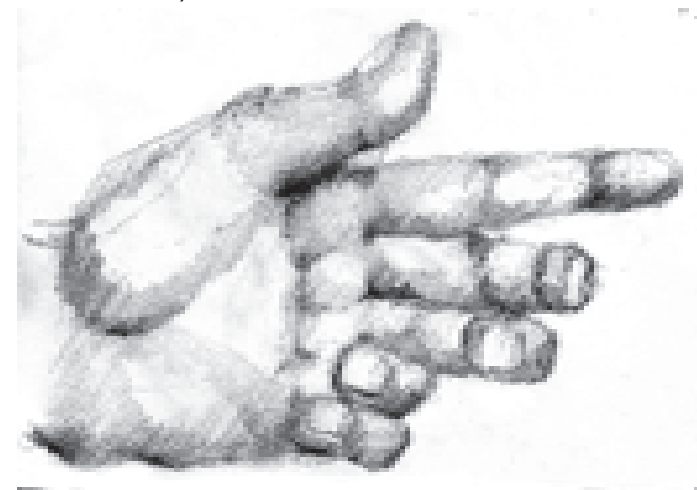
This God who goes with us, knows us. His knowledge is the interest of one who loves us. He is very much aware of all the goodness he has planted within our hearts. He knows the smallest things about us, our most touching moments, our darkest secrets and inmost fears. He recognises our strengths and weaknesses. He sees us as we stumble over our limitations. He smiles, as he looks on and sees us trying to overcome our weaknesses like a child's determined effort to stretch up and reach a shelf, just out

Good Friday - Jesus Crucified Lord

Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary of Magdala. Seeing his mother and the disciple he loved standing near her, Jesus said to his Mother "Woman, this is your son." Then to the disciple he said, "This is your mother." And from that moment the disciple made a place for her in his home... After Jesus had taken the vinegar he said, "It is accomplished"; and bowing his head he gave up his spirit." (John 19, 20.24)

Holy Saturday - Jesus in the tomb

After this, Joseph of Arimathaea... Asked Pilate to let him remove the body of Jesus. Pilate gave permission, so they came and took it away. Nicodemus came as well.. They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths, and following the Jewish burial custom. At the place where he had been crucified there was a garden, and in this garden a new tomb in which no one had yet been buried. Since it was the Jewish Day of Preparation and the tomb was near at hand, they laid Jesus there. (John 19, 40-42)



Monday of Holy Week - God who walks with us

Thus says God, the Lord... I have taken you by the hand and formed you; I have appointed you as covenant of the people and light of the nations, to open the eyes of the blind, to free captives from prison, and those who live in darkness from the dungeon (Is 42,7)

Tuesday of Holy Week - God who knows us

Simon Peter said, 'Lord, where are you going? Jesus replied, 'Where I am going you cannot follow me now; you will follow me later.' Peter said to him, 'Why can't I follow you now? I will lay down my life for you.' 'Lay down your life for me?' answered Jesus. 'I tell you most solemnly, before the cock crows you will have disowned me three times'. (John 13,37-38)

Wednesday of Holy Week - God who forgives us

The Lord has opened my ear. For may part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by insults. (Is 50, 6-7)

Holy Thursday - Jesus Bread of Life

For this is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and said, " This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me." (1Cor 11, 24)

of it's reach.

Since this God knows us he understands much more than we can imagine and so he forgives! Forgiving means that the person knows that the other has done wrong - may even have hurt him. He knows that there is some level of injustice which has to be accepted, if forgiveness is to be possible. It may be that the offending person has no right whatsoever to being re accepted by the person who has been offended, shamed, ignored or abused. If we look into our own lives and our experience, we know how difficult it is to forgive. It means putting our hurt pride, wounded dignity, shunned emotions and sense of justice to one side. Changing our perspective is only possible if we have something stronger than justice. The God who forgives is no stranger to being hurt, wounded, shunned ignored:

"As many people were aghast at him. He had no form or charm to attract us, no beauty to win our hearts; he was despised, the lowest of men, a man of sorrows, familiar with suffering, one from whom, as it were, we averted our gaze, despised, for whom we had no regard." (Isaiah 52, 13 - 53, 3)

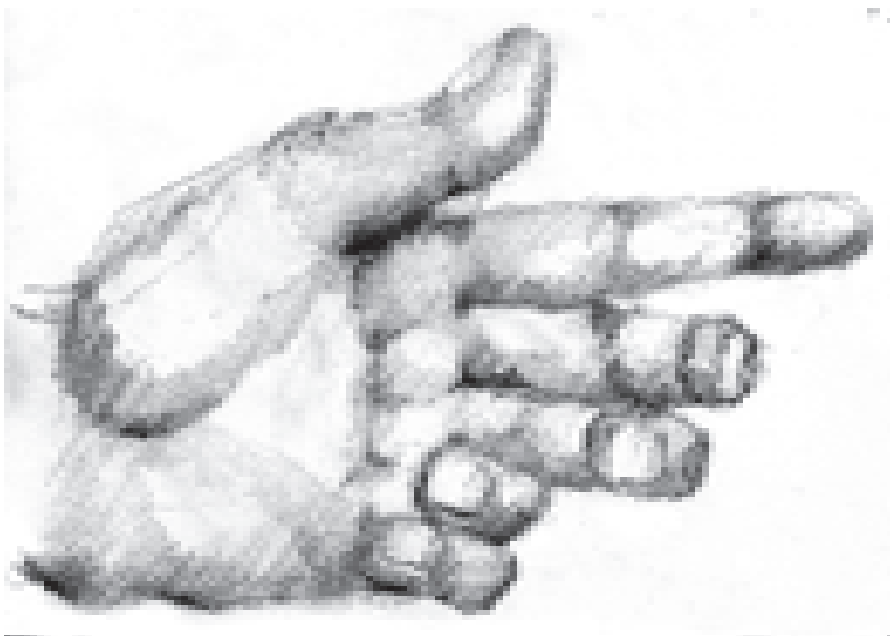
The depth of his love is revealed in the gifts he gave us: Jesus the Bread of Life, whose legacy was to remain with us, as we celebrate the Eucharist in memory of Him. Jesus who died for us on the Cross:

"Yet ours were the sufferings he was bearing, ours the sorrows he was caring, while we thought of him as someone being punished and struck with affliction by God; whereas he was being wounded for our rebellions, crushed because of our guilt; the punishment reconciling us fell on him, and we have been healed by his bruises." (Isaiah 53, 4-5) Jesus who spent three days in the tomb and rose again to bring us new life.

Through Christ our image of God changes. As the God who walks with us, who knows life's joys and sufferings, he brings us into a new intimacy with God, who is our Father.

“Father, you are the source of life and being, the universe lies cupped within your hand; the angel hosts adore your endless glory, the whole creation follows your command. Yet you bowed down to fashion from earth’s surface a creature whom you willed to call your child; a creature for whose love in freedom given you dare to see your plan of love defied.

Father, your care surrounded my life’s dawning, when you stooped down and raised me as your child. Nor have you ceased through times of joy and sorrow to keep me safe and free me from all harm. Where would I be, my Father, had you left me to live my life whichever way I pleased? But you have used the storms and stress of living to form in me the image of your Son. Amen”

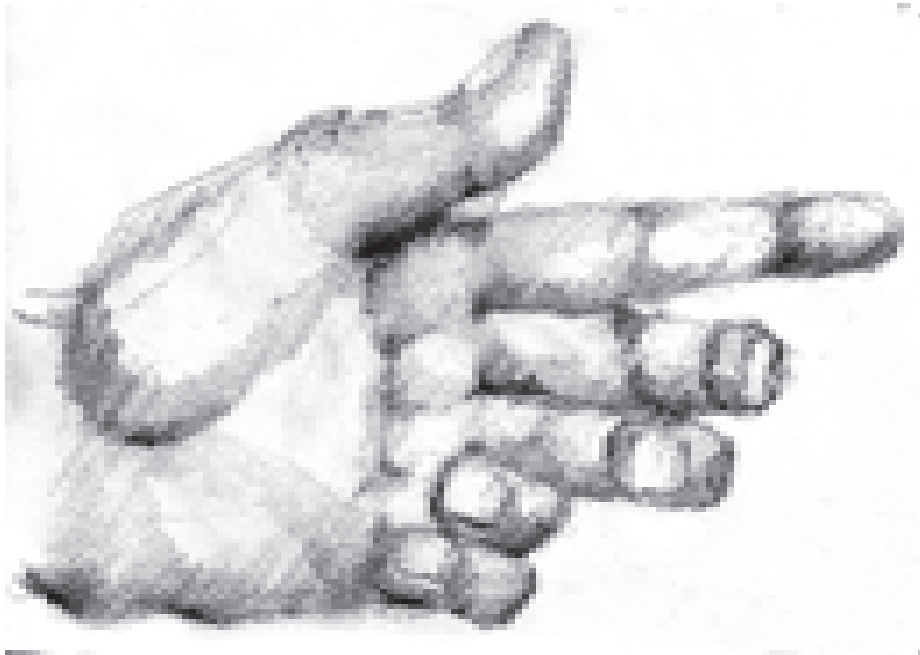

Story

God Walks With Us

The Story of loyalty to the Cross of Jesus

In the year 1856, archaeologists discovered on the Palatine Hill in Rome a very interesting site. They found the ruins of a garrison for Roman soldiers. On one of the walls in the largest room, they found the outline of a cross. The cross had been carved with some sharp object or with a knife. Underneath the cross there was the outline of a youth, holding up his hands to the cross in prayer. On the cross there was a man, but he had the head of a donkey. At the bottom were written the Greek words: Alexamenis sebete theon - which means: Alexamenos worships his God! It was a cartoon, a mockery, a joke-cross. The archaeologists believed that the buildings and the inscriptions must have come from the year 123 to 126 after Christ. The soldiers wanted to say that the Christian God is a donkey and whoever worships him is a donkey too.

In 1870, they discovered another set of rooms. In fact, it was a prison, adjacent to the garrison. And there on the wall, could be seen the clear answer of that youth Alexamenos. Scratched into the wall, underneath the Sign of the Cross, were the words: Alexamenos fidelis - Alexamenos will always remain faithful!

Then they took the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on its back, and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road,
